ASEAN+6 focus

Unlike other international LLM programmes, The College of Law programme focuses on cross-border legal practice in the ASEAN+6 region.

ASEAN: The Association of Southeast Asian Nations was founded in 1967. In December 2015, it formed the ASEAN Economic Community (AEC). The AEC seeks to establish the region's end goal of economic integration. It envisions ASEAN as a single market and production base, a highly competitive region, with equitable economic development, and fully integrated into the global economy. The ASEAN region is a \$US4.9 trillion market of 650 million people, that collectively ranks 7th in the World.

Master of Laws (Applied Law) with a major in ASEAN+6 Legal Practice

To receive the Master of Laws (Applied Law) with a major in ASEAN+6 Legal Practice, you need to complete eight subjects in total including the Capstone Project or Major Project. A minimum of four subjects must be from the ASEAN+6 Legal Practice jurisdictional stream.

ASEAN+6 Legal Practice jurisdictional stream

Choose from the following subjects:

ILP3 – ASEAN+6 Commercial Law Practice

The ability to draft effective, readable, non-ambiguous contracts is an essential and valuable skill for every commercial lawyer. This subject advances on the key knowledge and skill required by all lawyers when negotiating and drafting commercial contracts that involve parties, laws or businesses outside of your home country or in more than one jurisdiction.

ILP4 – ASEAN+6 Mergers and Acquisition Practice

This subject examines good operating practices and considers key issues when planning and executing cross-border M&A deals. It will help you to develop skills to analyse critically, reflect on, and synthesise information relating to mergers and acquisitions in ASEAN+6 contexts.

ILP5 – ASEAN+6 Banking and Finance Practice

The purpose of this practice-based subject is to advance on your knowledge about Banking and Finance Practice in ASEAN+6 contexts. It will help you to develop the skills to solve complex legal problems and support decision-making involving Banking and Finance Practice in ASEAN+6 contexts.

ILP6 – ASEAN+6 Intellectual Property Practice

This practice-based LLM subject examines key strategies and good operating practices for protecting and enforcing intellectual property rights in ASEAN+6 contexts.

ILP7 – ASEAN+6 Arbitration and Dispute Resolution Practice

Alternative dispute resolution is in increasing demand as parties seek different avenues to resolve their disputes. It is particularly important in an international context to help resolve cross-border disputes. This subject focuses on the key knowledge and skills required to participate in international arbitration and other alternative dispute resolution processes in ASEAN+6 countries.

ILP9 – ASEAN+6 Trade and Investment Practice

The ability to advise a client on the issues, risks and laws applicable to multiple jurisdictions in commercial contracts is an essential skill for lawyers practising in international trade and investment. This subject advances on the key knowledge and skills required when advising a client, negotiating contracts and drafting clauses.

ILP10 – ASEAN+6 Capital Markets Practice

This practice-based LLM subject advances on your knowledge about capital markets practice in ASEAN+6 contexts. This subject focuses on Malaysia, Singapore, Thailand, Indonesia, Philippines and Vietnam, the jurisdictions in which the exchanges collaborating under the ASEAN Exchanges are located.

Capstone Project

The Capstone Project is taken as your final subject, as a culmination of the knowledge and skills attained throughout your major. It will allow you to demonstrate your skills in a specialist practice area using real-life scenarios and case studies.

Throughout the intake, you will receive individual feedback from your lecturer and will also have access to an array of skills modules that include guides, samples, and practice exercises for honing your legal skills.

The highlight of the Capstone Project is the final task, where you will prepare a Final Portfolio that demonstrates your legal writing, research, and oral skills.

This is an assessment-based subject that has four components:

- (i) Four short answer questions
- (ii) Two legal writing samples
- (iii) Oral communication (e.g. client interview) assessment held through online conferencing
- (iv) Reflective analysis of oral communication

Major Project

If you have enrolled in the Master of Laws (Applied Law) without a Major, you are required to complete the Major Project in one of the practice areas included in your degree programme. The Major Project is taken over one intake and is a research-based project resulting in the submission of an 8000 – 10,000 word paper. This subject involves independent learning and non-timetabled study. You should expect the weekly workload involved in research and writing to be approximately ten to twelve hours per week.

Eligible students are required to submit a synopsis, maximum one-page in length, at least two weeks before the intake commences. The synopsis will be sent to your supervising lecturer for approval or feedback. Once approved, you will be formally enrolled in the Major Project. If not approved, feedback will be provided to assist you to refine the topic.

Graduate Diploma (Applied Law)

A Graduate Diploma (Applied Law) is offered in ASEAN+6 Legal Practice.

If you are not quite ready for a Master's degree, then a Graduate Diploma will provide you with the knowledge and skills to advance your career, without needing to commit to the extended study required for a Master of Laws. If you later decide to progress towards a Master's degree, all of your study in the Graduate Diploma will be credited towards that award.

A Graduate Diploma (Applied Law) in ASEAN+6 Legal Practice is awarded upon successful completion of four subjects from the ASEAN+6 Legal Practice stream.

A Graduate Diploma (Applied Law) is awarded upon successful completion of any four subjects from any jurisdictional stream.

Graduate Certificate (Applied Law)

A Graduate Certificate (Applied Law) is offered in ASEAN+6 Legal Practice.

Consider undertaking a Graduate Certificate if you have limited time, but would like to study some subjects in our LLM Applied Law programmes. If you later decide to progress towards a Master's degree or a Graduate Diploma, you will receive credit towards that award.

A Graduate Certificate (Applied Law) in ASEAN+6 Legal Practice is awarded upon successful completion of two subjects from the ASEAN+6 Legal Practice stream.

A Graduate Certificate (Applied Law) is awarded upon successful completion of any two subjects from any jurisdictional stream.

Entry requirements for our postgraduate specialisation programmes:

Students are required to provide a certified copy of **any one** of the following:

1. Transcript or graduation certificate of an academic qualification in law from any recognised university, or
2. Admission to practice in any jurisdiction, or
3. Current practising certificate from any jurisdiction




Postgraduate subject structure

9 MODULES (WEEKS 1-9)

- Review, read, prepare
- Participate in web conference or discussion
- Prepare and submit activity



ASSESSMENT MODULE (WEEKS 10-12)

- Written assessment 30%
- Oral assessment 30%
- Work portfolio 40%



Weekly activities

Each week focuses on an activity that you complete and submit to your lecturer. These can be self-assessment activities, skill-sharing activities, or written activities - see below for their descriptions.



Review, read, prepare

This consists of essential and additional readings. You may also be provided with some questions for the purposes of reflection and to prepare for the upcoming web conference or discussion.



Self-assessment activity

This is an activity that allows you to monitor and self-assess your understanding of course material for a module. Such activities will provide you with an opportunity to reflect and review your own work.



Web conference

The weekly web conferences vary depending on the subject and module. These may involve group discussion about the issues or topics arising from the readings, escalating dilemmas or role plays focused on client facing scenarios.



Discussion

The discussion forums allow you to discuss the same topics and questions that are covered in the web conference.



Skill sharing activity

This is an activity that requires you to prepare a presentation or other professional development activity on a relevant topic in order to demonstrate your comprehension of the topic.



Written activities

These are formative activities that may include checklists, memoranda, letters of advice, file notes or other drafting activities. These activities are usually no longer than two pages each. Completion of these activities throughout the subject enables you to receive feedback from your lecturer and and take it into account before submitting a nominated selection of activities as part of your final portfolio for assessment.



Written assessment

This is a drafting activity relevant to the material covered in the subject and is a realistic example of current professional practice.



Oral assessment

The oral assessment is a recorded presentation of a designated written skill-sharing activity completed during the subject. You will also review and improve the written skill-sharing activity. After feedback on the video presentation, a memo response is prepared in answer to the assessor's questions.



Final portfolio

This is the final assessment in the subject. It is a collection of nominated written activities prepared throughout the subject.



Frequently asked questions

How many hours per week do I need to set aside for study?

You should allow eight to ten hours study per week for each subject, to prepare for and complete the week's activities. In addition, you will be expected to attend weekly web conferences, participate in the discussion forums, and prepare for the assessments.

How many subjects should I enrol in per intake?

Our programme is designed to be undertaken part-time. If you are working full-time, we recommend that you take one or two subjects per intake. You have up to five years to complete the eight subjects required to complete the LLM programme.

Can I receive credit for any prior learning?

Yes, the College's Credit for Prior Learning Policy encourages practitioners who have completed previous postgraduate and other recognised study to apply for credit towards the LLM (Applied Law).

A maximum of three subject credits may be granted for the Master's awards.

- If you have undertaken a Graduate Diploma of Legal Practice with The College of Law, you may apply to receive up to two elective subjects of unspecified credit.
- If you have undertaken a Graduate Diploma of Legal Practice with another provider within the last ten years, you may apply to receive one elective subject of unspecified credit.
- If you have undertaken other postgraduate study, such as an LLM or Graduate Diploma of Law, whether you have completed the award or not, you may be eligible to receive credit for that study.

You can apply for recognition of prior learning online, along with your application for enrolment, and upload an original certified copy of your academic transcript.

Can I claim CPD units?

You may be entitled to claim CPD points for your study, subject to the requirements of your jurisdiction.



Where is the programme conducted? Do I need to attend any classes for the LLM programme?

There are no classrooms, the programme is delivered online, with all supporting course materials supplied online. You are not required to attend classes in person, but you will be required to attend online web conferences with your lecturer.

You will be provided with access to our cloud-based learning portal, which includes all the course materials you will need. Each subject is a 12-week structured and timetabled course that includes weekly readings and weekly activities that are submitted to your lecturer. The course includes automated online exercises, discussions, and web conferences with your lecturer and fellow students.

What documents are required to apply for this programme?

You will need to supply a certified copy of any **one** of the following documents:

- Transcript or graduation certificate of an academic qualification in law from any university, or
- Admission to practice in any jurisdiction, or
- Current practising certificate from any jurisdiction.

Subject fee

The 2019 subject fee is AUD\$3,300 per subject (GST exempt). The College's fees are reviewed annually and may be varied during your period of study.
